The Little White Church on the Hill: Clifton United Church

Clifton United Church in Stratford was built in 1847 as a Methodist Chapel. It is a small, quaint, wooden structure with no plumbing or electricity, but holds regular 9:00 AM services from June to October every year. It is located just off East River Drive in Bunbury, a few minutes from the Hillsborough Bridge.

The church seats about 65 people comfortably (including the "Choir Corner," depending on the season and the

weight of clothing) but is known to hold more at special services like Christmas. We do have a propane heater to take off the chill for our 7:00 PM Christmas service and we get light from lanterns and flashlights.

Our services are usually preceded by a hymn sing of favourites chosen by the congregation from our "Little Red Song Book." As the old pump organ no longer works, we must resort to a battery-powered keyboard. Nonetheless, Clifton folk like to "lift the rafters"!

Every May, members of the congregation form a work party to clean up the dust and dirt as well as any debris and mess little critters have left during the winter. We tidy up the property, including our flowerbed and cemetery, and then reward ourselves with a trip to Robins afterwards!



Mim MacInnis and Jackie McKinnon started attending Trinity in May 2018. Mim is an ICU nurse at the QEH; Jackie works within the Parks and Recreation department for the City of Charlottetown. Jackie and Mim have been together for 21 years and have two beloved cocker spaniels, Faith and Chance.

Jackie grew up in the Catholic church and has been an active member over the years. Mim grew up in the Presbyterian church and was quite involved when she was younger. As a couple, they occasionally attended church on special occasions, but never felt a belonging. Faith is a major part of who they are individually and as a couple. When they learned that Trinity is an Affirming Church, they decided to give it a try. They haven't missed a service since that first one—except when out of town.

Trinity means family and faith to Mim and Jackie. From day one, they felt welcomed with open arms. Each week, someone new comes and introduces themselves. They feel very much a part of our community. They said that they can *feel* that Trinity is Affirming, not just in name, but in action. They've had friends and family also start attending the church because they've had such positive experiences.

One very special memory is their wedding day. Jackie and Mim were married at Trinity on September 7, 2018. Another special memory is the first day they met Rev. Cathie and felt the genuine warmth of her welcome. Other favourite memories include services with large youth components, particularly the recent youth-led service in March. The Diverse-City Day service is another standout for Jackie and Mim. They were especially moved by the music of the Stratford Elementary School Choir and the life-story shared by Basel Al Rashdan, the Syrian boy who immigrated to Canada with his family in 2015.

Jackie and Mim noted that many of the additional worship opportunities, such as bible studies, occur during the day when shift workers may not be able to attend. They would like to see some evening options.

Of Doubt and FaithBy Ginny McGowan

doubt—noun 1. feeling of uncertainty; an undecided state of mind. (Canadian Oxford Dictionary, 2nd ed., p. 449)

Doubt, said Pope Francis, is a sign you want to know God better and more deeply: "We do not need to be afraid of questions and doubts because they are the beginning of a path of knowledge and going deeper; one who does not ask questions cannot progress either in knowledge or in faith" (Cindy Wooden, Nov. 23, 2016, *Crux*).

Madeleine L'Engle, author of one of my favourite childhood books A Wrinkle in Time, observed: "The minute we begin to think we know all the answers, we forget the questions, and we become smug like the Pharisee who listed all his considerable virtues, and thanked God that he was not like other men...Those who believe they believe in God, but without passion in the heart, without anguish of mind, without uncertainty, without doubt, and even at times without despair, believe only in the idea of God, and not in God himself."

Doubt is rarely mentioned—we're usually quite uncomfortable talking about it. What do you think? Is there room for doubt in our faith community?

In the Lenten season, our thoughts and prayers take on new meanings as we answer God's call to action in preparation for Easter Week.

When I was a child, I gave up the usual—candy—and swore not to fight with my brother. The first was easy, the second not so much. I've often thought why this

was so.

I recently read an interesting little book that helped me to see more clearly. It also helped me understand the patterns of my reactions and interactions with others. It's called habit.

In The Power of Habit: Why We Do What We Do in Life and Business, author Charles Duhigg explores the fascinating science that explains why habits exist (Cont'd p. 6)



The crest of the United Church of Canada is a spiritual and historic reminder. See if you can find these symbols:

Oval shape: like a fish, an early Christian symbol.

St. Andrew's cross: the first letter of the Greek symbol for Christ forms an X.

Four corners: three symbols associated with the founding communions of the United Church: Congregational, Methodist, and Presbyterian.

Dove: the Holy Spirit (Mark 1:10), whose transforming power is a mark of Methodism.


Burning bush: symbol of Presbyterianism (Exodus 3:2).

(from page 5)...and how they can be changed. Duhigg doesn't offer a prescription; rather, he acknowledges that habits differ from person to person and from behaviour to behaviour. He suggests an overarching framework: 1-Identify the routine, 2-Experiment with rewards, 3-Isolate the cue, and 4-Have a plan.

Changing some habits can be harder than others, and change can take a long time, with many repetitions and some failures.

This got me thinking. When we consider our community of faith, what habits have we, as a congregation, fallen into that impede our growth and stand in the way of change? Could this framework help us transform our community?
